It takes many efforts to affect positive change, but one of the mainstays is advocacy. Advocacy is any action that argues for cause on behalf of others, and this can occur at many levels.



#### Dr. Mari-Lynne Sinnott MD, CCFP

**Dr. Mari-Lynne Sinnott** is a two-time graduate of Memorial University. In 2009 she was a proud recipient of a Bachelor of Arts with honours. From there she entered Memorial's Medical School, and graduated in 2013 with her MD.

After she finished her family medicine residency in June 2015, she and her colleague opened Clinic 215, a neighbourhood family practice in downtown St. John's where she focused on LGBTQ2SIA+ health.

With a special interest in the care of vulnerable populations, she worked with the province and community partners in the development of the Downtown Healthcare Collaborative: a network of clinics that work within community organizations to provide inclusive and complete primary care to the marginalized populations of the city.

She is proud of her primary care practice, with a focus on providing gender-inclusive transition related care to trans\* and gender non-conforming folx throughout the province. She is involved in research and has co-authored several articles on gender-affirming care that were published in peer-reviewed scientific journals, and has peer-reviewed for several publications on topics related to gender diversity.

She sits on the Board of Directors of Trans Support NL, Inc. and has spoken at multiple conferences on transition-related care and fostering gender-inclusive clinical practice. As well, she holds a part-time faculty position with the Family Medicine Department at Memorial University and is involved in teaching both medical students and residents.

Dr. Amy Pieroway is a Family Physician working in Corner Brook

She grew up on the West Coast of Newfoundland and completed medical school and family medicine residency in 2013, both at Memorial University.

Since that time, she has worked in general family medicine, gender-diverse affirmative care, and care of the older adult population. She is passionate about teaching, creating linkages between physicians and gender equity in medicine.

When she is not working, she can be found on skis in the snowy seasons, and in her camper van with her husband and dogs throughout the rest of the year.

As Director of External Engagement (DEE), I sit on a variety of committees as a representative of the NL College of Family Physicians (NL CFP) and, more importantly, as a representative for NL family physicians. The graphic below highlights the organizations with which the NL CFP is currently engaging most closely.

### Here's an update regarding my current activities:

<u>Government of NL</u> – As DEE I'm constantly engaging with members of the Provincial Government on a variety of committees, and therefore I am frequently able to provide a family medicine perspective directly to those working on government initiatives. As well, during the recent election, a letter was sent to each party leader to make them aware of the NL CFP's role both as a member organization, and as an active and well-connected partner organization.

<u>Family Practice Renewal Program</u> – The NL CFP sits on the Family Practice Renewal Committee as a non-voting member. I provide input into initiatives designed specifically for family physicians, and I am in close contact with the FPNs.

**NLMA** – The relationship between the NL CFP and the NLMA continues to be strong. We meet regularly to discuss common issues and messaging. Joint statements are issued from time to time, and we utilize each other's resources and member reach.

**MUN Family Medicine** – While COVID has created challenges for our regular activities, we are developing new ways to interact with medical learners. Recently, I gave a presentation to all of the MUN residents during Resident Appreciation Week. We are also working on how to deliver some virtual procedural skill training to the medical students.

**Quality of Care NL/Choosing Wisely NL** – As DEE, I sit on the Quality of Care NL Working Group, which helps provide direction for the organization's projects. Through this role, I'm able to provide feedback on a variety of initiatives that target/involve family physicians, including Practice Points. My work in helping Quality of Care NL improve its direct engagement with family physicians across the province is ongoing.

<u>Health Accord</u> – This is what is keeping me the busiest these days. I sit on the Community Care Committee, which is working to develop a vision for community and primary care in our province. I have presented the Patient's Medical Home Model to the Committee, and the model will also be presented to the Task Force in the coming weeks. The NL CFP has also been asked to collect feedback from NL family physicians to bring directly back to the Task Force.


